Throughout the past few months, the Alpaca & Llama Club has been very busy. As a community service project, we went and helped Mountain View Homestead to clean up their farm and help with the rescued alpacas that they had taken in. To increase our fundraising, we held multiple Makerspace Days where we would go to the Brambleton Public Library and use their makerspace materials. We created designs for totes, shirts, bookmarks, and more, which were all very popular sellers.

During the February business meeting, our host Farmer Bonnie held a fiber education session. We learned how to brush fiber so that it could later be spun into yarn. This was then continued onto the next meeting in March, where Farmer Bonnie, as well as special guests Sean and Lauren Torstrom from Sparkbug Hallow Fiber Farm, gave a lesson on drop spindles and how to form fiber into yarn by hand. Our club learned a lot and appreciated both the Torstrom's and Farmer Bonnie's help.

Another big event for our club was preparing for and going to MAPACA. Our club members had to train with their alpacas to get ready for this big alpaca show. We worked on showmanship and obstacles skills and techniques throughout those sessions. We'd like to give a shoutout to all our members, as they all did amazing. It was a first show for many of them, yet many of our members came home with ribbons.

On our host farm, we've held many herd health sessions. During herd health, we go out and weigh the animals, then give them proper dosing of Ivermectin, which is a medicine that prevents meningeal worm. The meningeal worm is a parasite that alpacas and llamas are susceptible to. It's spread by deer and can be very infectious. Our host farmers find that giving their alpacas a monthly dose of Ivermectin can help protect their alpacas and keep them healthy. We've also had a couple of Friends of Farm sessions, where we go out and help Farmer Doug and Farmer Bonnie. We clean manure, fill water dishes, feed the alpacas, and help with any other farm chores that may need to be done. Our club has a credits system, where helping our host farmers out can earn us credits that can later be used to use their alpacas

for another activity, such as community service projects. Regarding our host farm Double 8 Alpaca & Llama Ranch, we are awaiting many cria births throughout the Spring. A llama cria, named Stella's Bella, was born in late March.

One of the events that we are looking forward to in the month of May is the Community Table at the Leesburg Farmer Market on May 6th. As a club, we plan to set up lemonade and donuts that are free to the public, but we will be accepting donations. This should hopefully bring our club some more funds. The next event is the Spring Farm Tour on May 20th. We will help out Double 8 Alpaca & Llama Ranch and will have an on-farm picnic afterwards.

Our next business meeting will be on Thursday, May 4th at Sykes Hall. It will be the checkpoint for our project books, which are due by the September business meeting.
